Central Maine Power Company, et al. v. Maine Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices, et al. (First Circuit Court of Appeals)

In this amicus brief to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit, NELF supports the plaintiffs-appellees challenging a Maine law that bars corporations with at least 5% foreign government ownership from any campaign spending. NELF argues the law is 'facially overbroad' under the First Amendment, imposing a blanket ban on political contributions without proof of actual foreign influence. Citing Supreme Court rulings, NELF contends that the state must show concrete evidence of foreign control to justify the restriction and urges the Court to affirm the lower court's decision striking down the law as unconstitutional.

PPC Realty, LLC v. City of Hartford

(Connecticut Supreme Court, No. SC 20826)

The Connecticut Supreme Court ruled in PPC Realty, LLC v. City of Hartford that the city can impose a lien on a blameless landlord to recover \$250,000 in costs from a fire caused by an arsonist. Despite Hartford admitting PPC bore no fault, the court upheld the lien, citing the legislature's intent to protect municipalities. NELF supported PPC in an amicus brief, arguing the plain language of the statutes. Staff attorney John Pagliaro criticized the decision, stating it allows the city to unjustly pressure PPC's business with a baseless lien.



E.M.D. Sales, Inc. v. Carrera (United States Supreme Court, on the merits)

NELF has submitted an amicus brief to the U.S. Supreme Court in E.M.D. Sales, Inc. v. Faustino Sanchez Carrera, addressing the standard of proof under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) for exempting employees from overtime pay. NELF advocates for a preponderance standard, requiring employers to prove exemption by 51%, instead of a stricter clear-and-convincing standard. NELF argues that a higher standard would unfairly burden employers and disrupt the balance Congress intended, emphasizing that the preponderance standard ensures fairness and preserves the legislative compromise on overtime pay.



FREE MARKET AFFORDABLE RENT

A Model Zoning Bylaw Alternative to Rent Control for MA Towns

Thought Leadership by the New England Legal Foundation

NELF's new Free Market Affordable Rent (FMAR) zoning model addresses the housing crisis by offering an alternative to rent controls. It streamlines housing development by reducing local regulations, speeding up permitting, and incentivizing developers to add affordable rental units.

Customizable by towns, FMAR caps rents based on the 80th percentile of Annual Median Income (AMI) (e.g., \$2,005 for a one-bedroom in Boston) and applies to properties with 30-year deed restrictions. This voluntary program avoids income-based restrictions and heavy bureaucracy, balancing market forces with affordable housing. NELF also provides free legal consultations for towns interested in adopting the model.




Orgs Tell Justices Stricter Proof Bar Isn't In OT Carveout

The New England Legal Foundation (NELF) and Washington Legal Foundation have filed amicus briefs with the U.S. Supreme Court in support of E.M.D. Sales Inc.'s challenge to a Fourth Circuit ruling. The case concerns whether employers must meet a "clear and convincing" standard to prove employees are exempt from overtime under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). Both organizations argue for a lower "preponderance of evidence" standard, asserting that the heightened requirement disrupts the legislative balance intended by Congress.

Benjamin G. Robbins of NELF stressed, "Only a mere-preponderance standard would preserve that legislative balance of competing interests, by giving virtually equal weight to the parties' respective interests... A clearand-convincing standard would destroy Congress's balanced treatment of overtime pay."

NELF's "Free Market Affordable Rent" Model Zoning Bylaw Featured in Contrarian Boston

Boston's Zoning Commission recently voted against Mayor Michelle Wu's Boston Net Zero Carbon Zoning Initiative, which would have banned fossil fuels in new housing and large commercial buildings. This pushback highlights concerns from business and real estate groups about rising costs and declining housing development amid a real estate downturn. The Wu administration remains committed to the plan, despite the housing slowdown and rising rents, intending to address the Commission's concerns in future meetings.

Meanwhile, the New England Legal Foundation (NELF) is proposing an alternative to rent control with its Free Market Affordable Rent (FMAR) zoning bylaw. Led by former judge Dan Winslow, NELF's plan aims to streamline approvals and reduce regulatory burdens for new developments in exchange for capping rents at 80% of the annual median income for half of the units. This approach is designed to boost the construction of affordable apartments without the typical bureaucratic hurdles, offering a market-based solution to the housing crisis.
